About SS4A

The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) established the <u>Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A)</u> discretionary grant program with \$5 billion in appropriated funds over five years, 2022-2026. The SS4A program funds regional, local, and Tribal initiatives through grants to prevent roadway deaths and serious injuries.

The SS4A program supports the U.S. Department of Transportation's (USDOT) <u>National Roadway Safety</u> <u>Strategy</u> and the goal of zero roadway deaths using a <u>Safe System Approach</u>.

Spotlight: The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)

As a SS4A grant recipient, you can leverage public health data and other resources to gain valuable insights to help address the intersection of transportation, safety, and community health.

CDC's Transportation Safety Program

CDC's Transportation Safety Program provides information and actionable resources that can help SS4A grant recipients make data-driven decisions to prevent crashes, injuries, and deaths on our nation's roads. Grant recipients can find out about using public health data, like <u>emergency department</u> <u>data</u>, to help with planning, implementation, and evaluation of road safety efforts. Additionally, CDC provides <u>state and</u> <u>Tribal resources</u> as well as guides and reports on safety topics, such as <u>Tribal road safety</u>, <u>pedestrian</u> and <u>bicycle</u> <u>safety</u>, <u>child passenger safety</u>, and more.
